

1972 NATIONAL REGATTA

The 1972 National Town Class Regatta was held August 12-13 on Lake Quannapowitt, Wakefield, Massachusetts. Twenty boats turned out representing five fleets from Marblehead, Nahant, Newburyport, Sharon (Lake Massapoag) and Lake Quannapowitt. Three past National Champions participated: Nate Nichols from Marblehead, Champion in 1967 and 1969; Wilson Tibbo from Nahant, 1970 Champion; and Danny Perepelitza from Nahant, 1971 and defending Champion.

On Saturday four races were sailed in medium to heavy air, characterized by severe gusts and sudden shifts. Tommy Forbes of Marblehead sailed away with the first race, with Bob Davidson of Quannapowitt and Nate Nichols of Marblehead second and third, respectively. In the second race, Marblehead stalwart Len Meredith won a tight race with John Cort and Wilson Tibbo, both of Nahant, second and third. In the third race local skipper, Leo Campbell, narrowly beat Ray Walton of Newburyport with Peter Sutcliffe, also of Quannapowitt, coming in third.

Len Meredith repeated his second race win in the fourth, beating two home skippers, Dick Cook and Mike Ferro. At the end of the first day Len Meredith was the clear series leader.

Sunday saw quite different conditions with light, flukey winds and here the lake sailors began to come into their own. The morning race was won by Pete Pitsker from Sharon, with Danny Perepelitza second and Leo Campbell third. In the final race, Peter Sutcliffe of QYC led at the first mark and kept his lead despite a lastminute battle with Tommy Forbes who came in second; Nate Nichols of Marblehead was third.

The final standings showed Quannapowitt skippers in first, second and third places. Dick Cook won with 21 points, his consistent 4, 4, 5, 2 and 6 finishes paying off well. Leo Campbell was second with 22-3/4 points from finishes of 6, 1, 7, 3 and 6 and Peter Sutcliffe third with 24-3/4 points from 9, 5, 3, 7 and 1st. The full results are shown on the following page.

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The host club, Quannapowitt Yacht Club, is celebrating its silver anniversary in its present location on the Lake, but was originally founded at the South end in the late 1800's. Although the actual founding year is shrouded in the mists of antiquity, it is certainly one of the oldest inland yacht clubs in the country (possibly the oldest!). It has a membership of about 120 and has a very active, five series, 60 race season with seven one design fleets participating. The fleets are 110's, Duxbury Ducks, Snipes, Day Sailers, Townies, Mercuries and Blue Jays and it is not uncommon to see 75 boats on the line for the Sunday series.

Next year the National Regatta will be sailed at Marblehead.

NARRAGANSETT NEWS

Some members of the Sharon Fleet found a fleet of nine Townies actively racing on Narragansett Bay this summer. We have a contact in the group and the President is hopeful that we can draw them into the Association and once more enjoy competition with the Bay sailors.

SPECIFICATIONS COMMITTEE

The major activity during the 1971-72 winter months was the revision of the jib specifications and the incorporation of minor amendments on centerboards, etc. The jib was respecified to ensure that the "traditional" curved leech and foot shapes would be maintained, and the minimum length of the luff was specified to eliminate the deck-sweeper configuration. However, the new specifications only apply to sails made and sold after January 1, 1972; any sails made prior to that date can be used indefinitely.

New specification books were printed and have been distributed to Fleet Representatives so all skippers should have their own copies by now.

MARBLEHEAD RACE WEEK

This year the weather smiled on the MRA and a fine week's racing was had by all. Winds varied from light to over 20, but for only a few minutes were there flukey conditions. The turnout of Townies was less than in previous years; a maximum of 26 boats was on the line. This led to running only one Division instead of the usual Blue and White Divisions of previous years.

The series, and New England Championship was won by John Tucker and his wife, Terry, with a remarkably consistent series which netted only 9-3/4 points for five races to count. Lake sailor, Peter Sutcliffe from Quannapowitt, was second with 20 points and received the John Alden trophy, which used to be awarded to the winner of the White Division. Barry Nichols of Marblehead was third with 21-3/4 points, followed very closely by Wilson Tibbo of Nahant and Dick Booma of Marblehead each with 23-3/4 points.

The Marblehead Town Fleet hosted a dinner meeting at the Corinthian Yacht Club on the Tuesday evening and had a very good turnout. Let us hope we can get more entries next year and make the Townies the dominant fleet they used to be at Marblehead Race Week.

The QYC Fleet consists of 21 boats this season, approximately half of which are fiberglass. The average turnout on the line for the Sunday races has been about 10-12 boats which is slightly less than in 1971.

The Spring Series resulted in a tie between last year's Fleet Champion, Peter Sutcliffe, and newcomer to the Townies (and this year's National Champion!) Dick Cook, with 13½ points each from seven races. They both had equal numbers of firsts (2) and Sutcliffe took the series with 4 seconds to Cook's 3 seconds.

The Summer I Series was also won by Peter Sutcliffe with 13½ points, Mike Ferro being second with 24¼ and Dick Cook third with 31½. Peter also won the Twilight Series from Mike Ferro, Leo Campbell taking third place.

The QYC Fleet was delighted with its 1, 2 and 3 places in the Nationals, but commiserates with Tom Forbes of Marblehead who would have won handsomely but for his DSQ in the third race.


BOAT PERFORMANCE

Harry Bell, QYC Day Sailer Champion and member of the Race Committee for the 1972 Nationals, took data from each race and has come up with some interesting results.

He timed the winner in each race, computed the total distance sailed, hence the average boat speed, and compared it to the average wind speed which he measured with an anemometer during each race. In computing the distance sailed he used the actual mark-to-mark distance for off-wind lengths and 1.2 times the mark-to-mark distance for windward legs. This factor is the mean between a one-legged beat and a one-tack-on-the-layline course. The results are as follows:-

The results are plotted in the attached graph and it is interesting to see that they indicate that the maximum average boat speed of a Townie is about 4.5 knots. This is equivalent to about 1.2 x L where L is the waterline length in feet. This is also consistent with published data on other boats where 1.4 L is the very best boat speed achieved by J class boats and 1.1 L is typical of the average achieved by Bermuda race winners.

Race committees should find the graph useful in setting courses in differing wind conditions when the time for a race is limited.
